EMPLOYEE STOCK OWNERSHIP PLANS

In some cases, in the early days of a company perhaps, it can be difficult to

come up with enough cash to set this up at the outset. No worries, as you can take out a loan to do so, and then the trust can eventually pay back its loan. In many cases, the way these stocks are distributed is based on employee pay and how long they have been with the company.

UNDERSTANDING ESOPS

In its simplest form, an ESOP is a retirement plan or trust fund that allows employees to sponsor their own company by becoming shareholders. It means that the company is literally employee-owned. The official definition by the National Center for Employee Ownership (NCEO) is "employee ownership is a term for any arrangement in which a company's employees own shares in the company's stock."

To further look at the way ESOPs work, it means you as a company owner set up an ESOP trust. This trust will contain contributions made by existing

owners who will buy shares of contributed cash. This amount cannot be more than the fair market value of the company. Again, if you don't have the resources to put cash into the company at the beginning, the ESOP itself can take out a loan to buy either existing or brand-new shares. Then, the trust will pay the loan. Employees come into the picture by purchasing shares in this trust. When employees leave the company, you can buy back their stock from them at fair market value, giving the employee the value of the shares, often in cash form.

BENEFITS OF IMPLEMENTING AN ESOP

The benefits of implementing an ESOP into your existing company's financial environment are many. The breakdown below will outline some of the most applicable for your modern business:

TACTICAL:

Tax incentives. Let's face it, we all want to save money when we can as it relates to taxes. ALIGNMENT OF EMPLOYEE AND COMPANY INTERESTS

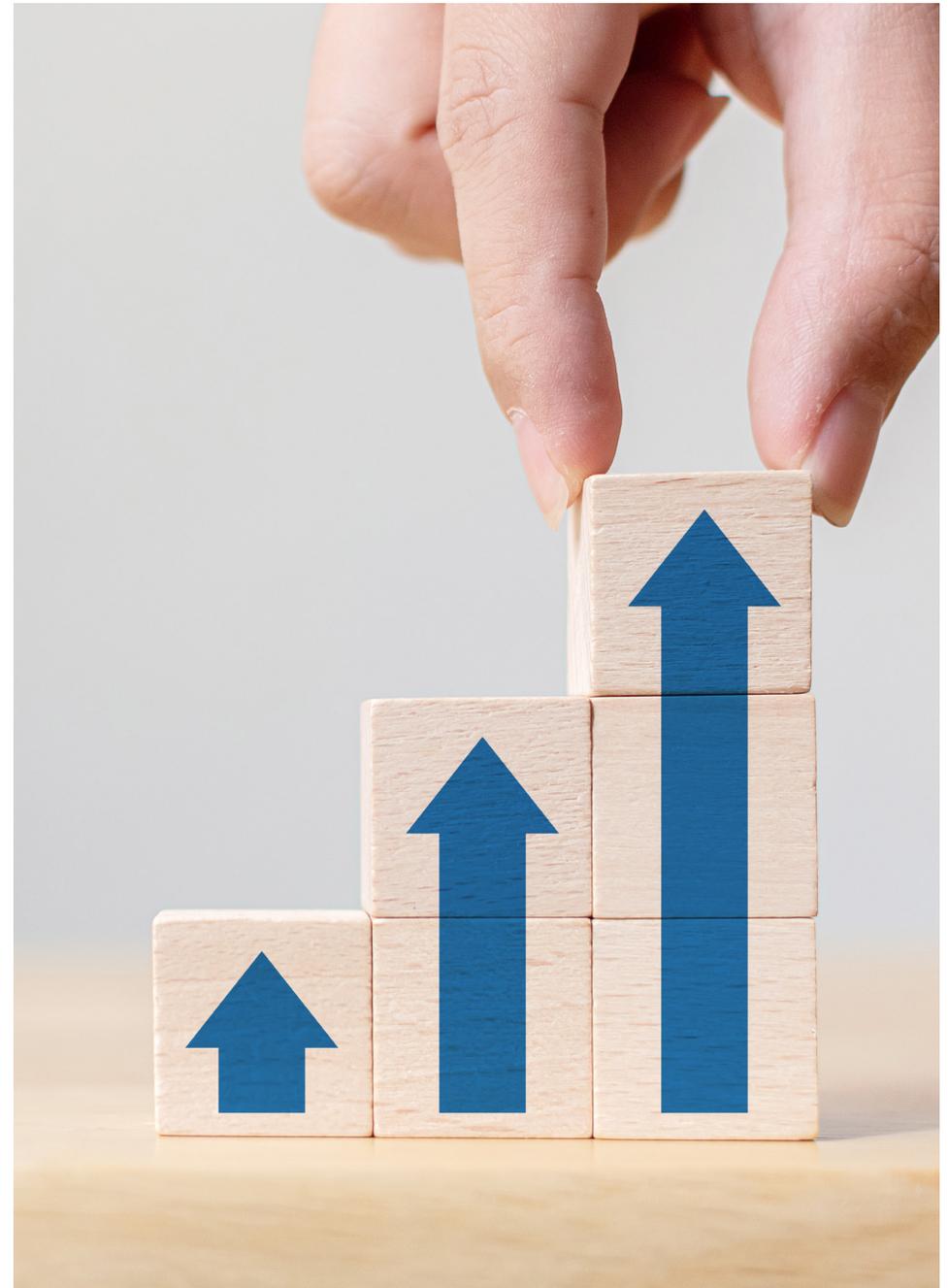
